Academy of Root Development (Australia) Inc 2018 Annual Report

Academy of Root Development (Australia) Incorporated was established in 2005 to source donations and on-going funding to support the social development of disadvantaged women and their families in Bihar, India.

ARD has worked with Microfinance initiatives through Self Help Groups and Income Generating Activities and is now working in the areas of Reproductive and Child Health, as well as Literacy Centres for illiterate adolescent girls.

The ARD(Australia)Inc project is being delivered through it's operational centre in Guraru township by "Women's Empowerment in Indian Villages" (WEIV) which has a trained staff of 13 in the Reproductive and Child Health programme and 8 teachers in the Literacy Centres.

Reproductive and Child Health

The Reproductive and Child Health programme is entering its fourth year of operation and the benefits are becoming more and more evident in the lives of the participating families.

WEIV field-staff meet regularly with individuals and groups of newly married women, pregnant women and new mothers to deliver health education to pregnant and lactating mothers on safe delivery, nutrition, breast-feeding, child care, sanitation and hygiene and to make them aware of existing government health support programmes.

Gender equality is promoted through Adolescent Girls Groups, Adolescent Boys Groups and Literacy Centre's for Girls.

WEIV staff and programme participants attend government Village Health Sanitation and Nutrition Days (VHSND), where we are supporting the Bihar Health Department in the proper implementation of all aspects of Reproductive and Child Health.

Literacy Centres

ARD(Australia)Inc has, since May 2015, established eight Literacy Centres for poor adolescent girls, who otherwise would not be engaged in the education system. The girls are taught Hindi reading and writing, functional mathematics and basic English.

An average of twenty adolescent girls are enrolled in each of the Literacy Centres, making a total of one hundred and sixty girls. Classes run from 10am to 2pm, which allows the girls time in the morning and evening to perform domestic and rural working duties to support their families.

Wendy and Graeme visit the project every year and have many tales to tell of the impressive work being done with adolescent girls and boys, newly married women, pregnant women, married women and community members.

Child marriage, equality for women and girls, eradication of the dowry, literacy for illiterate adolescent girls, vasectomies and reproductive health and hygiene are just some of the areas covered.

Earlier this year, Committee Members Fay Goodchild and Bayla Nerden accompanied them on the visit to the project. Here is the report Fay Goodchild wrote about her visit:

Doing Due Diligence in Bihar

Having followed and supported WEIV for the last year, not only was I moved to join the Committee but I also booked a ticket to Bihar, India, to see first-hand the work being done by ARD. Talk about Due Diligence!

I joined Wendy and Graeme, and committee member Bayla in Bodhgaya, our base from where we visited Guraru Block. We stayed in the ARD office, and travelled to the villages supported by WEIV. For the visits and meetings we needed 2 interpreters to travel and sit with us as no-one speaks English, while Co-ordinator Sarika, and supervisors have limited English. We split into two groups in order to cover all centres and projects.

These villages are in deep rural India, where rarely if ever a Westerner is seen. Each day we visited one literacy centre and another WEIV group. For me this included visiting a new mother from a pregnancy support group, a newly married woman at home, an adolescent girls group, and a self-help group. I also participated in meetings with the supervisors and teachers.

It was great observing and 'speaking' with these girls and women, asking how the programs have affected their lives, and hearing their enthusiastic feedback. I was moved and impressed observing the classes and groups. For most of them education is more often than not an option. Despite initial shyness they soon opened up and were happy to show off what they know. It was encouraging to see how keen the girls were to display their skills and share their knowledge.

Particularly inspiring were the older women, newly married or pregnant, and the adolescent girls. They have moved forward from learning the basics of the Literacy Centres to having a real appreciation of Education on every level, and he opportunities it provides. They are now able to envision a future of possibilities beyond the traditional roles they were traditionally expected to fill. It was also encouraging to meet their extended families, who are learning from these girls and supporting their family members participating in WEIV programs.

A highlight was meeting with first female Mayor of Guraru Block, herself a graduate of the WEIV micro finance and self-help group program! Each evening we would get together discussing what we saw, what was working and what needed fine-tuning. We had meetings with dedicated female Co-ordinator Sarika, herself a village woman, the Supervisors and the teachers. It was a very full couple of weeks with long but fulfilling days.

What I took back from this unique and emotional journey: Witnessing the truly positive impact and changes WEIV is having on girls, young women and their families. Also experiencing the dedication of founders Wendy and Graeme. It is no small feat logistically, physically and emotionally to pull the work of WEIV together.

So I saw the proof for myself: WEIV projects are successfully employing local educators to promote reproductive and child health, increase female literacy rates, improve women's status in their communities and support women to take control of their own lives. I am still in the afterglow of this wonderful experience, and humbled and proud to be on the committee of WEIV.
